Machine Demonstrations:

This Month's Helpful Tip.

STAINED DISTRESSED FINISH TECHNIQUES

Bob Kolderie has been involved with wood stained finishing techniques for some time and would like to share with members a particular system used by furniture manufacturers in the South East Queensland region where he distributed Wattyl Industrial Coatings. These particular finishes are applied to pine furniture. The following steps are described:

SANDING

Along the direction of the wood grain use a flat hand block to achieve a 180# sanded surface. If required start with 80#, followed by 120# and finish with 180#. Do not sand across the grain as this will show scratches later in the staining.

STAINING

Use turps based stains of your choice, but traditionally the colours used were:

Baltic Pine, Golden Oak and Heritage Teak.

Testing such colours on a prepared piece of pine is a good idea to see if perhaps these colours could be diluted to give you a lighter version by adding turps.

To explain y to use turps based stain; On a large surface area it is nearly impossible to achieve an even colour result if a spirit or water based stain is used.

Brush the stain on liberally all over one total surface area, and than wipe the area with a dry lint free cloth along the direction of the wood grain, ensuring an even colour finish is achieved.

Use a large brush to get the stain on quickly, as leaving it sitting too long before wiping can result in an uneven colour finish. Also do it on a cold to mild day as in very hot situations the base coat could dry before you get a chance to wipe it. I like using cotton shirt or sheets material. Wear surgical gloves as it can get messy!

CLEAR SEALER COAT

Before applying ensure stained surface is dry, preferably leave for two days.

Again use a turps based clear sealer coat of polyurethane in a low sheen or satin gloss level.

A spray pack application is ok, but ensure a decent coating is applied by spraying along the grain first, than across and finally along the grain again.

If brushing a product, do two coats, first a liberal coat across the grain, and than finish by smoothly spreading the applied coat along the grain in one motion, lightly, from one side to the other without lifting the brush, and with the least amount of pressure. Let this coat dry for at least two days.

Than denib the surface by lightly rubbing along the grain with fine grade 000 steel wool.

Vacuum the surface free from any dust.

STRESSING THE SURFACE

This is done by putting dents and marks over the surface.

Implements you can use vary from hitting a chain over the surface to marking with wire brush or a meat tenderising hammer, or what ever comes to hand like a screw driver or blunt knife. Just bash it to your hart's content.

APPLYING BLACK STAIN

Use a turps based Bitumen stain or Black Japan. Apply with a coarse rag like hessian liberally over the entire surface, and wipe of with a lint free cotton rag along the direction of the grain. Ensure you remove any residue from the undamaged areas of the surface to expose the stained colour. You should see the black left in the cracks or holes created when stressing. Leave to dry for two days

FINISH COATS

Apply first coat of Satin polyurethane as described earlier with either Spray pack or brushing.

Leave to dry for 1-2 days, and then very lightly rub very fine 0000 steel wool along the grain to denib the surface area. Brush vacuum the surface clear from any dust.

Apply a second and final Satin Polyurethane coat in a dust free area on a calm day.

After two days, inspect the finish, and most likely you will find some imperfections cause by an insect or a popped air bubble etc, but a final rub over the surface with a soft Wax applied with a very fine Scotch Brite, or coarse Hessian rag, followed by a good rub with a dry cotton rag to remove any wetness, will see a beautiful finish.

Peter Brotherton also brought along to show and tell the turned vessel below. It is made from African Utile, Huon Pine with a veneer inlay around the outer edge. It is finished with EEE and Shellawax.





The turned bowl at left and Tea Candle Holder were made by David Keating as part of John Tanner's SIG wood turning course. They are in Pine and finished with EEE and Shellawax. Well done David.

The pair of Saw Horses in stained Pine were made by Nick Stone and Ann Salmon as part of the recent Basic Woodcraft SIG course conducted by Eric Simes. Well done Ann and Nick.

Mask Stand.

Eric and Wendy Simes needed an entry screen for their home to act as a visual barrier between the entry foyer and living room beyond, as well as to proudly display their leather mask and also provide additional storage space.

As Eric explains: "The grid of the screen is the same as the slate tiles on the floor and we also have some similarly small square windows in nearby walls. The entire project was designed early in the year and it took many hours to properly design the jig to cut the halved joints in the screen. To make the jig for the router to cut the halved joints it was first necessary to make a jig to make the jig. Confused? You should be as I was. The jig had to be square, and when I cut the vertical members of the grid I had to have the exact same setup for the cross members. It actually worked. No one was more surprised than me. There are 150 halved joints in the screen and more on the cabinet. They all went together with a little persuasion with a mallet and only less than half have been glued. It's all a nice tight fit. Only problem with the timber (Casuarina Torulosa) like all She Oaks is that they split down the grain and are impossible to put through a drum sander as they burn."

Main screen and cabinet frame is Casuarina Torulosa (Rose She Oak) and drawer fronts, top and sides are recycled 100 year old Toona ciliate var. Australis (Australian Cedar) recovered from an old railway building in Bathurst.

You will be able to view the Mask Stand at Eric's place where our November monthly meeting is held.
